

On the night that he was betrayed, your Son Christ Jesus, gathered with his faltering friends for a meal that tasted of freedom.


Calling them to his table, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and said:



MUSIC NOTES

The so-called Matin Responsory is in fact an adaption of a Magnificat by Palestrina, together with words from the First Responsory of Advent Sunday in the Office of Matins, in the early medieval Roman Rite. It has become widely known through its use in the annual Advent Carol Service at King's College, Cambridge. It is sung from the west end of the chapel, before the procession begins to move towards the east end, symbolically from darkness into light.

Paul Manz (1919-2009) was a noted American organist, teacher, lecturer, conductor and scholar, as well as composer. 'E'en so, Lord Jesus, quickly come' (1953) is probably the most frequently performed of his compositions. The text was adapted by Manz and his wife Ruth from Revelation Chapter 22 in response to a serious illness suffered by their three-year-old son. The anthem begins in B flat minor, but turns at the end to D flat major - reflecting the move from darkness to light celebrated in the seasons of Advent.
