PROCESSIONAL HYMN

Jesus calls us here to meet him, as through word and song and prayer we **affirm God's promised presence** where his people live and care. Praise the God who keeps such promise; praise the Son who calls us friends; praise the Spirit who, among us, to our hopes and fears attends.

> Jesus calls us to confess him Word of life including all, sharer of our flesh and frailness, saving all who fail or fall. Tell his holy human story; tell his tales that all may hear; tell the world that Christ in glory came to earth to meet us here.

WELCOME

God of grace, we come today with Easter joy, seeking to be a people of resurrection. Gather us together now, form us into a community of your people, and reveal to us the Holy One. Amen.

FORGIVENESS

Liturgist:

We come seeking forgiveness for all we have failed to be and do as members of Christ's body.

Silence

In God there is forgiveness.

Loving and all-seeing God, forgive us where we have failed to support one another and to be what we claim to be. Forgive us where we have failed to serve you; and where our thoughts and actions have been contrary to yours we ask your pardon.

Bishop:

God forgives us; be at peace.

Silence

Rejoice and be glad, for Christ is resurrection, reconciliation for all the human race.

We shall all be one in Christ, one in our life together. Praise to God who has created us, praise to God who has accepted us, praise to God who sends us into the world.

A NEW COMMANDMENT

Liturgist:

Hear the teaching of Christ:

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another as I have loved you.

Spirit of God, search our hearts.

THE CONFIRMATION

GOD'S CALL

Bishop:

E te whānau a te Karaiti,

THE PRESENTATION

The sponsors present each candidate

Bishop Ross, I present N to profess his / her faith. Bishop Ross, I present Liam to re-affirm his faith.

Bishop:

Tamara, Jeffery, Jessica, Harriet, Liam we welcome you as you come to profess and reaffirm your faith. At your baptism you were made a disciple of Christ, and we signed you with the cross. Come now to receive the laying on of hands with prayer, to strengthen you for the work of God's kingdom.

THE AFFIRMATION

Please stand.

Praise to God who has given us life. Blessed be God for the gift of love.

Praise to God who forgives our sin. Blessed be God who sets us free.

Praise to God who kindles our faith. Blessed be God, our strength, our hope.

Let us, the baptised, affirm that we renounce evil and commit our lives to Christ.

All respond:

Blessed be God

Jesus is Lord!

The bishop then says to the candidates for laying on of hands

What is your faith?

They respond:

I believe and trust in God the Father, maker and sustainer of all things; and in God the Son, my Saviour Jesus Christ; and in God the Holy Spirit, giver of life and truth. This is my faith.

Please be seated.

COMMITMENT TO CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Those who are baptised are called to worship and serve God. From the beginning, believers have continued in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers.

Bishop: Will you commit yourself to this life?

Candidates: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: Will you forgive others, as you are forgiven?

Candidates: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: Will you seek to love your neighbour as yourself, and strive for peace and justice?

Candidates: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: Will you accept the cost of following Jesus Christ in your daily life and work?

Candidates: I will, with God's help.

Bishop: With the whole Church will you proclaim by word and action the Good News of God in Christ?

Candidates: I will, with God's help.

THE LAYING ON OF HANDS

The candidates kneel, the bishop continues

Let us pray for these who have declared their commitment to Christ's service.

The bishop prays

God of mercy and love, new birth by water and the Spirit is your gift, a gift that none can take away; grant that your servants may grow into the fulness of the stature of Christ. Fill them with the joy of your presence. Increase in them the fruit of your Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of love, patience and gentleness, the spirit of wonder and true holiness.

The bishop lays hands on each candidate in silence and then prays.

FOR CONFIRMATION

Creator Spirit, strengthen *Tamara / Jeffery / Jessica / Harriet* with your gifts of grace, to love and serve as a disciple of Christ.

Guide, protect, uphold her/him that s/he may continue yours forever. Amen. FOR RENEWAL

Creator Spirit, rekindle in *Liam* your gifts of grace, renew his life in Christ and bring to completion all that your calling has begun. Amen.

At the conclusion of the laying on of hands for all the candidates, the bishop prays

Living God,

empower your disciples to bring life to the world.

Amen!

May we and they together be found in Christ and Christ in us.

THE CELEBRATION OF FAITH

All standing, the bishop says to the congregation

Let us rejoice with those who have committed themselves to Christ, and celebrate the faith of our baptism.

All: I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Ch**rist, God's only Son, our Lord,** who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of the Father, and will come again to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

PRESENTATION OF CERTIFICATES

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

Bishop:

Let us pray for those far and near, people and places, powerful and powerless, all for whom we are concerned.

Leader: For your love and goodness

All: we give you thanks, O God.

THE PEACE

Please stand for the Greeting of Peace.

The peace of God be with you all.

In God's justice is our peace.

E te whanau, Christ calls us to live in unity. We seek to live in the Spirit of Christ.

Please turn and greet those around you with peace.

THE OFFERTORY HYMN ²

When we turn away, and our love fails,


your love remains steadfast.

this is my blood of the new Covenant,


which is shed for you and for all,

THE INVITATION

If the stairs are a barrier please sit in the front pews and communion will be brought to you.

MUSIC NOTES

John Rutter's Requiem was written in 1985 and first performed in October of that year. Following the precedent established by Brahms and Fauré, among others, it is not strictly a setting of the Requiem Mass as laid down in Catholic liturgy, but instead is made up of a personal selection of texts, some taken from the Requiem Mass and some from the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. The Lord is my shepherd sets Psalm 23 and was originally written in 1978 as a standalone anthem for Mel Olson and the Chancel Choir of First United Methodist Church in Omaha, Nebraska.

Thomas Attwood (1765-1838) became a chorister at the Chapel Royal at the age of nine. At the age of sixteen he was presented to the Prince of Wales (who later became George IV) who was impressed enough to send him on a course of study abroad in Naples and then in Vienna where he became a pupil of Mozart. In 1796 he was appointed organist of **St Paul's Cathedral**. The anthem Come, Holy Ghost is a paraphrase by John Cosin (1594-1672) of Veni Creator Spiritus, the ancient hymn for Pentecost.

Edward Elgar's stirring anthem The Spirit of the Lord is the prologue to his oratorio The Apostles, which tells the story of the disciples of Jesus and their reactions to the extraordinary events they witness on the first Pentecost through the gifts of the Holy Spirit.
