


# SUNDAY SEPTEMBER

We thank you for the ages long of gathering stars and cooling earth, of life evolving and waking eyes of wonder.


We thank you for the creatures with whom we share the world, for their lives so different from our own and the richness they reveal.

Calling them to his table, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and said: This is my body, which is given for you. Do this to remember me.


In the same way after supper, he took the cup, saying:

#### THE LORD'S PRAYER



#### MUSIC NOTES

Grieg originally published "Våren" in 12 Melodies, Op. 33, in 1880. They were song settings for voice and piano, later arranged for string orchestra, solo piano and organ. The words were by the Norwegian poet and journalist Aasmund Olavsson Vinje (1818-1870). The poem describes the Norwegian landscape's seemingly magical emergence from winter to spring. The poet wonders if this might be their last spring, observing that life has brought so much more than expected, and that some day all must come to an end. So much of Nordic life is shaped by the long winter and longing for spring. Quiet, loneliness, and isolation are frequent themes. With all of the uncertainty around climate change and the pandemic that we have all faced over the last few years, we are yearning for the light, warmth, and hope of a new spring.

Based near Kristiansand in Norway, Mons Leidvin Takle (born 1942) has studied in Stockholm, Copenhagen, Chicago and New York. Not only a church musician, he is also a well-travelled concert organist and prolific composer of vocal, instrumental and widely performed organ compositions. His unconventional, jazzy style tends to break down barriers and often drives audiences wild! Power of Life, dedicated to the English concert organist Christopher Herrick, is the first of nineteen pieces in a collection called Festivity, a set of highly extrovert, no holds barred, wonderfully over the top compositions. This energetic piece, with its non-stop rhythmic drive, carries along catchy melodies as well as insistent repeated notes and chords in its furious headlong race towards a Beethoven-style coda. Takle has a special relationship with NZ organist Kemp English, who has performed much of his music here.
