#### Liturgist:



sun and moon, and shin-ing stars, praise the liv-ing


Praise the Holy Name, whose word speaks all things into being, who created the forces of the universe and the laughter of children. Praise the Holy Name!

# THE GREAT THANKSGIVING




It is right and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Creating God. In you all things are good.

On the last night Jesus shared a meal with his friends, he took bread, gave thanks to you, broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said:


Take, eat: this is my Body which is given for you.



# THE INVITATION

#### MUSIC NOTES

O Lord, give thy Holy Spirit shows Tallis writing in English for the reformed rites of Edward VI and Elizabeth (who reinstated Edward's First Prayer Book of 1549 when she came to the throne). This exquisite miniature, a setting of a prayer published in 1566, obviously dates from the time of Elizabeth I.

Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo writes this about his motet Ubi Caritas, "The first time I sung in a choir was in high school; I went to a music high school in Norway and choir was obligatory. I loved it from the very first rehearsal, and the first piece we read through was Maurice Durufle's Ubi Caritas. It will always be one of my favorite choral works of all time; to me, it's the perfect a cappella piece. So when I set the same text myself a few years later, it was inevitable

that the Duruflé would influence it, and it did. While Duruflé used an existing, traditional chant in his piece, I used chant more as a general inspiration, while also echoing the form and dynamic range of his incomparable setting of the text."

Translation: Where charity and love are, God is there. Christ's love has gathered us into one. Let us rejoice and be pleased in Him. Let us fear, and let us love the living God. And may we love each other with a sincere heart.

In honour of Mother's Day, Ka Waiata Ki a Maria is a popular Maori hymn venerating Mary, the mother of Jesus, for accepting her role as mother of future generations.

Richard Puanaki (1949-2021) taught at Catholic schools at Wairoa, in the Hawke's Bay. In the mid 1980s he composed several himene, including Ka Waiata, with the help of his whānau singing group Te Whetu o te Rawhiti. Richard recalled how there was some resistance from conservative members of his church when he wrote this hymn. "They all wanted me to change the 'whare tangata' and replace it with 'whare atua'. This is the womb being referred to, and the more traditional or conservative among us are happier with the divinity of Jesus, hence the womb as a 'house of God'."

Translation: I sing to Mary, our mother, the one who heard God's call. The call to be the mother of our Lord (of us all). Gentle woman, loving mother, our Lady Queen of Peace.
